This is my first year having the honour of being the Chairman of Northern Territory Police Legacy (NTPL). As we move towards the end of the year, I want to thank all our financial members, volunteers and board of management who make the incredible work that NTPL undertakes possible. Without them we couldn't remain in a position to continue to help Police Legacy legatees and families of those who have lost a loved one.

This year NTPL has been able to provide over \$108,679 to support legatees and families through \$98,960 in education grants and \$9,719 for children's birthdays, Christmas and development grants. A mention must go to all those who assist in making this possible from generous donations to time volunteered, it truly has an impact on families in need.

On June 17 the inaugural National Police Legacy Day was launched to honour the work undertaken by Police Legacies across Australia. We were also privileged to host the National Police Legacy Conference this year; it was well attended by all jurisdictions who were able to experience some of what the NT had to offer with crocodiles and humidity featuring heavily.

National Police Remembrance Day remained a solemn occasion of remembrance for fallen Police officers, their families and communities. This year being especially tragic with three police officers gunned down and killed in Victoria and Tasmania as those officers went about their duties to keep their communities safe. This highlights the omnipresent dangers of Policing and highlighted the importance of Police Legacies across Australia who stand ready to assist those families when most in need.

As we move into the new year, NTPL remains committed to continuous improvement. We will have new fundraising activities throughout 2026, improve the mechanism through which we onboard new members, offer new rounds of branded merchandise and explore options of additional support we can provide our Police Legacy legatees. I actively encourage our members, legatees and families to provide us with feedback and ideas. How can we do our business better?

Finally, I would like to extend my appreciation to the NTPL Board of Management for instilling in me their trust in being the Chairperson for NTPL. It is an honour to serve in this role, and I provide my ongoing commitment to continue to advance the interest of NTPL, its legatees, their families and our blue family.

# National POLICE LEGACY Day

On 17 June 2025, a new tradition was born for policing families across Australia — the first-ever National Police Legacy Day. It's a day to pause and reflect, not on what we've lost, but on what continues: support, connection, and care. For us in the Northern Territory, the meaning of Legacy is personal. It's about real families, real challenges — and the people who stand beside us through it all.

## A TERRITORY STORY: THE CUBILLO FAMILY

When ACPO Alberto Cubillo passed away in 2008 after a brave battle with cancer, he left behind his wife Teri and three young daughters: Demi, Abby, and Tyla.

"He absolutely loved his job," said Teri. "Even while undergoing treatment, he kept working. It's what kept him going."

NT Police Legacy was there almost immediately.

"Tony Fuller from Police Legacy was at my house helping with funeral arrangements. I'll never forget that" Teri recalled. "You really do feel part of the Police family."

## SUPPORT THAT DOESN'T FADE

That support didn't stop at the funeral.

Thanks to NT Police Legacy, the Cubillo girls had help with schooling — and two have now completed university degrees without a HECS debt.

- Demi, now 27, is a teacher at Wulagi Primary School.
- Abby studied sports business management.

"Police Legacy paid for my entire degree," Demi said. "It gave me a head start in life. I'll always be grateful."

Karen Cheal, our NTPL Secretary, has kept in regular contact with the family

over the years — another reminder that Legacy's care doesn't end, it continues.

## A NATIONAL EFFORT

There are eight Police Legacy organisations across Australia, each committed to the same goal: ensuring that when a police officer dies, their family is not left behind.

NT Police Legacy, founded in 1990, continues to provide long-term emotional, financial, and educational support to our Territory families.

Marcus Tilbrook, Board member and Provisional Vice Chair, puts it simply:

"Our mission is to honour the memory of those who served — and to help their families build lives shaped by resilience and hope."

## LAUNCHED WITH HEART

The day was officially launched at Parliament House in Canberra by Dr Andrew Leigh MP, Assistant Minister for Charities. He described Police Legacy organisations as being built on "dedication, discretion, and deep humanity."

The National Police Legacy Day logo, a Michaelmas daisy, symbolises remembrance and protection — fitting for a day that honours the families of police officer's past and present.

# NT POLICE LEGACY HOSTS THE 2025 NATIONAL POLICE LEGACY CONFERENCE IN DARWIN

*“Working Together is Success”*

Northern Territory Police Legacy (NTPL) had the honour of hosting the 2025 National Police Legacy Conference in Darwin – the first time since 2017 that the Territory has welcomed Police Legacy delegates from every Australian jurisdiction.

The conference took place on Saturday, 26 July 2025, at the Territory Conference Room, Development House, on The Esplanade in Darwin.

Marcus Tilbrook, Provisional Vice-Chair of NT Police Legacy, chaired the proceedings, supported by NTPL Secretary Karen Cheal.

The weekend brought together Police Legacy leaders from around the nation to share experiences, discuss common challenges, and strengthen the collective mission of caring for police families.

## A WARM TERRITORY WELCOME

The day opened with a Welcome to Country by Demi and Tyla Cubillo, proud Larrakia legateses, accompanied by their mother Teri Cubillo.

Their late father, Aboriginal Community Police Officer Alberto Cubillo, served with distinction before his passing in 2008.

Their participation set a heartfelt tone for the conference, honouring both the families NTPL serves and the deep connection between the Northern Territory Police and the Larrakia people.

Marcus Tilbrook then welcomed delegates, outlining the conference objectives and reaffirming the shared commitment of all Police Legacies to the families of officers who have died in service or in retirement.

## KEY THEMES AND PRESENTATIONS

The conference program focused on strategic collaboration between the state and territory Police Legacies.

Discussions covered:

- Renewal and signing of the National Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)
- Planning for the National Police Legacy Day (NPLD) and coordinated national branding

- Development of shared fundraising opportunities and merchandise initiatives
- Representation at National Police Remembrance Day (NPRD) and continued support for the Wall to Wall Ride for Remembrance
- Transition of the National Secretariat to AFP Legacy for the 2025–26 term

Guest speakers included Martin Shaw, President of Wounded Heroes Australia, and Nathan Finn, President of the NT Police Association and Vice-President of the Police Federation of Australia.

Mr Shaw spoke about programs supporting veterans and first responders, including Coffee4Heroes and the 24 Hours of Heroes campaign, which raised over \$96,000 this year.

Mr Finn addressed mental health and wellbeing challenges in policing and the vital safety net Police Legacy provides to families nationwide.



## BEHIND THE SCENES

The success of the 2025 National Police Legacy Conference was the result of exceptional teamwork.

Event coordination was led by Karen Cheal and Mel Burnett, whose dedication, planning, and professionalism ensured every element ran smoothly.

They were ably supported by Owen Blackwell, who provided valuable logistical assistance across venues and operations

Their collective effort showcased the capability and spirit of NT Police Legacy — ensuring delegates experienced both Territory efficiency and Territory hospitality.

“Hosting this conference was not just about logistics,” said Marcus Tilbrook.

“It was about bringing the Police Legacy family together, reaffirming why we exist, and demonstrating that the Northern Territory plays an active, proud role in this national network.”

## CONFERENCE DINNER

The weekend concluded with the National Police Legacy Conference Dinner, held at the Darwin Sailing Club on Saturday evening.

The tropical setting, overlooking Fannie Bay, provided the perfect backdrop for reflection, connection, and celebration.

The Guest of Honour was His Honour Professor the Honourable Hugh Heggie AO PSM, Administrator of the Northern Territory and Patron of NT Police Legacy.

His Honour spoke warmly about the enduring importance of Police Legacies and their role in caring for the families of those who serve.

Other special guests included:

- The Hon. Steven Edgington MLA, representing the Chief Minister of the Northern Territory
- Selena Uiibo MLA, Leader of the Opposition
- Martin Shaw, President, Wounded Heroes Australia
- NTPL legatees Diane Bowers, Paula Bradford, and members of the Cubillo family

## NATIONAL WALL TO WALL RIDE FOR REMEMBRANCE

Today, our Wall to Wall - Ride for Remembrance riders gathered at The Alpine Hotel in Cooma before making their way to Exhibition Park in Canberra. Police Members and Veterans and Community Members. From there, together, they will travel to the National Police Memorial, forming a national convoy of unity and respect riding side by side to honour and remember the police men and women who have tragically lost their lives in service to their communities.

This annual event, which is now in its 16th year and held in support of Police Legacies throughout Australia, will see over 1750 motorbikes converge on the National Police Memorial for the National Wall to Wall Remembrance Service today at 4pm.

Mr Steven Langdon, accompanied by NT Police representative Kylie Anderson, will

carry the Commissioners Baton and place it at the National Police Memorial.

At today's service, a new plaque has been added for long serving and respected Tasmania Police officer Constable Keith Smith, who was killed in the line of duty on 16 June this year while responding to an incident in the state's northwest. With the acknowledgement of two Victoria Police members, Senior Constable Vadim De Waart and Detective Leading Senior Constable Neal Thompson, who died in Porepunkah on Tuesday 26th August.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to all the riders who take part in this meaningful journey. Your commitment ensures that the service and sacrifice of our fallen officers are never forgotten.

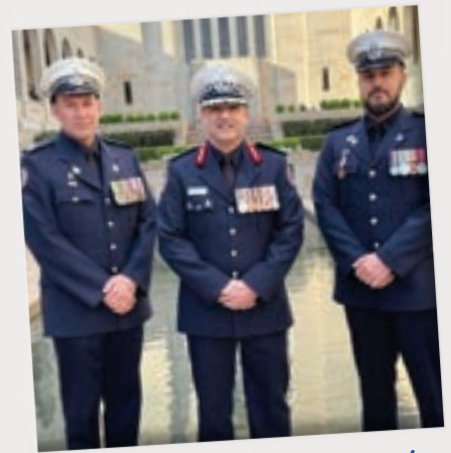

29 September – is National Police Remembrance Day across Australia and the Pacific – when we commemorate our colleagues and mates who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

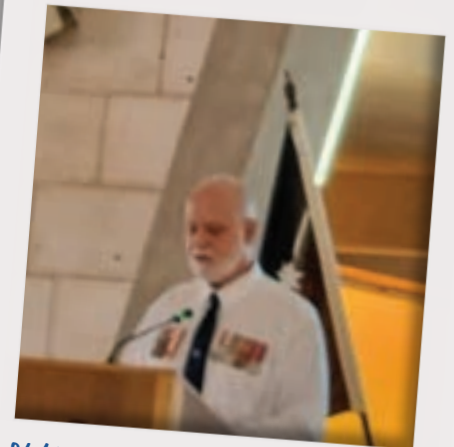

If you are a serving police officer within NT Police, and you donated \$5 via payroll deductions or pay giving each fortnight, your full year donation was \$130. This information is on your payslip. All donations over \$2 are tax deductible.

The minimum fortnightly payroll deduction (donation) is \$5. That is less than the cost of a cup of coffee, isn't it? It's a good time to double-check your deductions—are you at the \$5 per fortnight minimum? 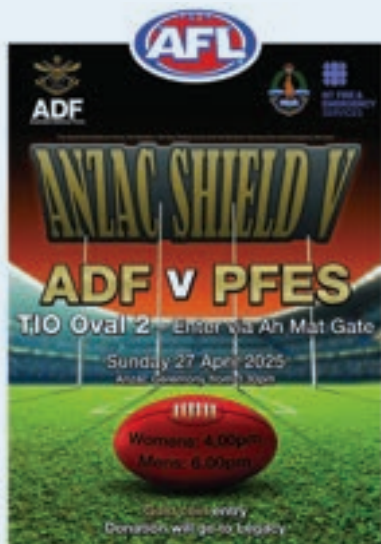
